The Society was founded in 1995 and became a Registered Charity, Number 1096515, on 14 March 2003. Its objects as a registered charity are the advancement of religion and the education of the public by fostering as widely as possible the Christian Ecumenical Movement, in a way that combines practical experience in social, international and interfaith fields with theological reflection and exploration in regard to divisions between Christian denominations, in particular by providing occasions and a regular forum within which persons and groups of different backgrounds, races and theological convictions can meet for exchange of information, for discussion and to work together on study projects, where appropriate in collaboration with other groups or agencies.

Membership

The Society's network of people at the end of 2009, including subscribers, honorary members and certain related bodies and institutions, stood at 129. Of these, however, only 41 were subscribing and paying members, raising serious doubts as to the future financial viability of the Society and its activities, as well as its role as a useful facilitator of contact and dialogue among academics, church officials and leaders nationally and locally, the ecumenical instruments and other interested and informed parties.

- John Calvin at 500: Catholic & Ecumenical with two penetrating assessments from Dr Donald Norwood and Dr Richard Price of Heythrop College
- The Churches' Debt to Darwin: Acknowledging God's Entire Creation with Professor Simon Conway Morris, Professor of Evolutionary Palaeobiology at the University of Cambridge and Dr Denis Alexander, Director of the Faraday Institute, St Edmund's College, Cambridge
